This Act is the *Australian Veterans' Recognition (Putting Veterans and Their Families First) Act 2019.*

3 Object of this Act

The object of this Act is to acknowledge the unique nature of military service and the sacrifice demanded of those who commit to defend our nation.

4 Definitions

In this Act:

Permanent Forces has the same meaning as in the *Defence Act* 1903.

Reserves has the same meaning as in the Defence Act 1903.

veteran means a person who has served, or is serving, as a member of the Permanent Forces or as a member of the Reserves.

Part 2—Recognition of veterans and their families

1 2 5 General recognition 3 (1) The Commonwealth acknowledges the unique nature of military 4 service and the sacrifice demanded of those who commit to defend 5 our nation. 6 (2) The Commonwealth acknowledges the demands placed on, and the 7 sacrifices made by, the families of veterans. 8 (3) The Commonwealth acknowledges that veterans may require 9 support mechanisms to enjoy good health, to access employment 10 and training opportunities, to access appropriate housing, to have 11 access to justice, to enjoy social wellbeing or to participate in 12 community engagement after the end of their military service. 13 (4) The Commonwealth is committed to supporting veterans and 14 providing the care and support they require. 15 (5) The Commonwealth acknowledges that support for veterans should 16 be provided in a way that respects their dignity as individuals, 17 enhances their self-esteem, is sensitive to any physical or mental 18 injury or disease they may have suffered and respects their military 19 service. 20 (6) The Commonwealth acknowledges that veterans should be 21 supported to achieve greater economic wellbeing and sustainability 22 and greater participation in civic affairs and should have 23 opportunities to participate in employment and education. 24 6 Australian Defence Veterans' Covenant 25

The Parliament, on behalf of the people of Australia, endorses the Australian Defence Veterans' Covenant set out in Schedule 1.

2	(1) The Commonwealth is committed to decision-makers interpreting

12	(2) The Commonwealth is committed to decision-makers deciding
13	claims under that legislation:
14	(a) in a manner that is fair, just and consistent; and
15	(b) except under the MRC Act—within a time that is
16	proportionate to the complexity of the matter; and
17	(c) in a manner that promotes public trust and confidence; and
18 19	(d) on the basis of only requiring evidence sufficient to meet the relevant standard of proof for the claims.

20	(3) The Commonwealth is committed to the Military Rehabilitation
21	and Compensation Commission deciding a claim under the MRC
22	Act within 90 days beginning on:
23	(a) the day the Commission receives the claim; or
24	(b) the day the Commission receives information, or a document,
25	that the Commission requested in relation to the claim under
26	section 330 of that Act;
27	whichever occurs later.
28	8 Cooperation
29	The Commonwealth is committed to working cooperatively with
30	veterans, their families and ex-service organisations to address
31	issues facing veterans.

Part 3—Issue of pins, cards or other artefacts

9	Issue of	pins,	cards	or	other	artefacts

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- (1) The Commonwealth may issue pins, cards or other artefacts to veterans in recognition of the military service of veterans.
- (2) The Commonwealth may issue pins, cards or other artefacts to family members of veterans in recognition of:
 - (a) the military service of veterans; or
 - (b) the demands placed on, and the sacrifices made by, the families of veterans.

3	10 Part 2 does not create or give rise to rights or obligations
4 5 6	(1) Part 2 does not, by its terms or operation, create or give rise to any rights (whether substantive or procedural), or obligations, that are legally enforceable in judicial or other proceedings.
7 8 9	(2) A failure to comply with Part 2 does not affect the validity of any decision, and is not a ground for the review or challenge of any decision.
10	(3) No action, suit or proceeding is to be instituted in reliance on the terms of Part 2 or the operation of that Part.
12	11 Act not intended to exclude similar State or Territory laws
13	This Act is not intended to apply to the exclusion of any law of a
4	State or Territory that provides for the recognition of veterans or
5	their families.
